Have you ever played Bible trivia and been asked this question, "What is the shortest verse in the Bible?" Did you answer correctly? Its John 11:35, "Jesus Wept." This verse is more than an answer to a Bible trivia question. These words convey the deep affection Jesus had for His dear friends; Lazarus, Martha, and Mary. In the passage, Martha and Mary had requested Jesus come to heal their sick brother, Lazarus. When Jesus arrived at Bethany, He did not find a sick Lazarus to heal, but he found His friend had died four days earlier. The sisters expressed regret that Jesus had not made it to Lazarus in time to heal him. Jesus comforted them by reassuring them Lazarus would rise again. As Jesus observed the grief of the family, the Bible says He also felt the burden of their grief, and that burden is the occasion of the shortest verse in the Bible.

What has occurred to me recently is Jesus had already revealed Lazarus would rise again and had reassured the sisters' death for the believer is not final, nor hopeless. Nevertheless, Jesus knowing His plan and power, still felt the burden of people He loved and suffered that grief Himself. Though John 11:35 is brief, its implications are monumental. If Jesus, who had perfect faith and peace, could still experience such grief that it would bring Him to tears, it must be acceptable when we grieve our loss even when we have faith to believe God is incredibly good and ultimately in control.

The passage in 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 teaches Christians may grieve, but not as those who have no hope. When we incorporate our faith in Christ into our bitter disappointments, there is a hope that strengthens and comforts us. So, Jesus wept on a fitting occasion, and so may we, but because of Christ, our times of sorrow will be turned to joy. John 16:20

"AMAZING GRACE"

How Sweet the sound
That saved a wretch like me
I once was lost but now am found
T'was blind but now I see

"Amazing Grace" is probably one of the most beloved hymns of the last two centuries. It is estimated to be performed ten million times annually and has appeared on over 11,000 albums. It was written by a former slave trader, John Newton in 1772. He wrote the words of this song from personal experience. He had many twists in his life that led him to being captured to serve as a slave on a ship where he was beaten to near death. Later he was rescued, and upon the return voyage was caught up in a raging fierce storm, that caused him to cry out to God for deliverance (*Psalm 25:17-20*). John Newton had rejected the gospel teachings of his mother's, but his thoughts began to turn to Christ as he recalled scriptures from his early childhood. He was transformed by the power of God's unconditional love for him. At one point, he decides to abandon the slave trade altogether devoting his life to God's service. It was years later, as an old man, he writes in his diary "Not well able to write; but I endeavor to observe the return of this day with humiliation, prayer, and praise." Only God's amazing grace could take a rude, profane, slave-trading sailor and transform him into a child of God. He lived until the age of eighty-two and continued his ministry until his health began to fade away a few years before. Even at the end of his life, he continued praising God as he said, "My memory is nearly gone; but I remember two things: That I am a great sinner, and that Christ is a great Savior."

John Newton's story is very moving! And now we can see, the lyrics of this hymn carry a much deeper meaning than just our mere gratitude. I don't believe he would have written "Amazing Grace" without his past. Do these words describe your past; "how sweet the sound, that saved a wretch like me, I once was lost, but now am found, t'was blind but now I see"?

Then something deep inside cries out, "Oh, God, You are the One Who gave salvation to this world by sending us Your Son!"


Each day proclaims the gospel with each miracle it brings As dawn and sunset shout Your praise; Oh, how creation sings!















"Lord, Am I a Cultural Christian?" By Nancy Mitchell

"Have you ever considered this question? "Well, to understand this, I could replace Cultural Christian with Unsaved Christian. These folks attend church regularly and have a passion for helping their friends and neighbors. They believe in God, some have memorized scripture, and pray when something important arises. They believe they are a good person, and this makes them a Christian. The focus is appeasing themselves, not the work of Christ on their behalf, which is the key point Cultural Christians miss. They do not see their sin as God sees it. (Isaiah 53:5-6) The bible tells us that none is righteous, no not one. (Romans 3:10) Sadly, a Cultural Christian's testimony does not line up with God's Word. (Eph 2:8-9)

One Afternoon, I engaged in conversation with Janice Taft, who shared her story of how God revealed to her, she was a *Cultural Christian*. Janice began "I attended a church retreat when I was a young girl and gave my life to Christ. I read my bible and tried to do the right thing. Later in my life, I begin to search other faiths going from church to church, feeling an emptiness within me. One Autumn Sunday morning, as Pastor Toby Cambron was preaching, I realized that I had been a Cultural Christian all my life. This emptiness I felt was because I needed to be born again (John 3:3-7). I needed God's spirit to change me. Suddenly, I felt a warm feeling moving over my chest. The Holy Spirit had touched me like I had never felt before. At the end of service that day, I told Pastor Toby about this experience, so he prayed with me to receive Christ as my Savior." Our interview had ended, but as I walked away, I began to pray "Lord, am I a Cultural Christian?"
